LA County Voters approved Measure J in the November 2020 Election.



Measure J mandates at least 10% of the County's locally generated unrestricted funding will address impact of racial injustice.

How will Measure J address the impact of systemic racism and incarceration?

By investing those funds in community recommended programs such as:

- youth development
- job training
- mental health services
- small business development
- supportive housing services
- and other alternatives to incarceration.

What were this Subcommittee's ideas for services, investments, and/or strategies that can eliminate (or greatly reduce) those disparities and challenges for the impacted groups in Reentry?



- **1. Employment services** (11) job training programs, jobs after being released from prison, youth job placement in various types of jobs (union jobs, public service (e.g., fire department), entertainment industry)
- 2. Strengthen community infrastructure, including directly giving money to community-based organizations doing reentry work, third party/fiscal sponsor processes (5)
- 3. Transitional services and education centers located throughout the city (e.g., vocational and technical training, education, learn about community resources available, get driver license/ ID card, employment services (fill out a job application, build a resume, how to manage in the workplace), life skills (use a phone, use a computer, hold a conversation, control/manage anger, etc.) (5)
- 4. Health and mental health centers, including substance use programming (4)
- **5.** Housing permanent, supportive, rapid rehousing (6)
- 6. Supporting women and families, including reunification with children & families (4)



What were this Subcommittee's ideas for services, investments, and/or strategies that can eliminate (or greatly reduce) those disparities and challenges for the impacted groups in Reentry?



- 7. Supportive services for lifers coming back home (e.g., elder care, medical care) (2)
- 8. More resources in Black & brown communities to prevent incarceration (3)
- 9. Mentorship (2)
- **10.Pairing people with counselors/ case managers** to support all of their needs (e.g., mental health and health needs, housing, education, jobs)
- **11.Wraparound services**, such as Wrap-around Engagement Desert Outreach (WEDO), a successful collaborative program in the Antelope Valley
- **12.**Healing spaces/ Healing circles (6)
- **13.Gang prevention and interventions** that **heal & empower gang members** to reduce the violence from an equitable & truthful lens and include them in the solution (5)
- 14.Peer led programming and advocacy (2)



What were this Subcommittee's ideas for services, investments, and/or strategies that can eliminate (or greatly reduce) those disparities and challenges for the impacted groups in Reentry?



- **15. Services providing positive social connections**, trauma-informed, harm reduction, culturally competent and informed, flexible to **meet individual needs**, COVID-19 strategies, and provide basic needs(7)
- **16. Collaborative, integrated and coordinated efforts** across multiple programs and sectors that create a pipeline of care (5), including conducting a landscape analysis of community-based organizations providing reentry services and programs, substance use (e.g., overdose prevention and education), legal aid, gun control, immigration. Examples of programs: DOORS (Developing Opportunities and Offering Reentry Solutions)
- 17. Transformative and restorative justice programs and practices (2)
- 18. Invest in Successful services Breaking Barriers (Brilliant Corners program), Arc Housing, Mass Liberation (Torrance), Amity, Homieunidos, Homeboy Industries, A New Way of Life, The Goodseed, LA Voice Peacemakers, Project 180, Health Right 360, Hope and Redemption team, DOORS (Developing Opportunities and Offering Reentry Solutions), Wrap-around Engagement Desert Outreach (WEDO), Amity Foundation, Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership (LARRP), Pride In Truth
- 19. Solutions and service staff include people with lived experience (8)



What were this Subcommittee's ideas for services, investments, and/or strategies that can eliminate (or greatly reduce) those disparities and challenges for the impacted groups in Reentry?

HOW

- 20. Funding should not go back to LA County programs (2)
- 21. Services/programs should include ways to measure impact and outcomes, including using community-based participatory research, non-traditional and indigenous evaluation methods (3)
- 22.Invest in immigrant youth
- 23. Universal health care and insurance
- 24. New funding streams outside of the systems that cause us harm
- 25. Build off of the **ATI report recommendations** (4)
- 26.Use community land trusts
- 27.Embrace and include **Native American tribal consultation** when developing services and programs

Alternatives to Incarceration Recommendations: Reentry Share

Shared at Meeting #1

- Create and expand decentralized, <u>coordinated service hubs in strategic locations</u> across the eight Service Planning Areas (especially SPA 1, 3, and 7) where people, their families, and support network can seek referral and/or immediate admission 24hours a day to a spectrum of trauma-informed services.
- Expand <u>family reunification models and connect families</u> to low-cost or no-cost parenting groups.
- Establish <u>effective restorative justice programs for the adult justice-involved</u> population by learning from existing County and other programs, especially those serving youth.
- Optimize and increase the appropriate use and process for <u>mental health</u> conservatorship and assisted outpatient treatment, and resource them accordingly.





Alternatives to Incarceration Recommendations: Reentry Share

Shared at Meeting #1

- Support and <u>broaden implementation of community-based harm reduction strategies</u> for individuals with mental health, substance use disorders, and/or individuals who use alcohol/drugs, including, but not limited to, sustained prescribing of psychiatric medications and MAT.
- Increase employment and retention of Community Health Workers (CHWs) to expand service capacity, cultural competency, and client/provider trust.
- Institute a <u>presumption of pre-trial release for all individuals</u>, especially people with clinical behavioral health disorders, whenever possible and appropriate, coupled with warm handoffs to community-based systems of care, to provide targeted services, if necessary, to help individuals remain safely in the community and support their return to court.
- Improve <u>equal access to all treatment resources</u> for justice-involved individuals, wherever they may be (in or out of custody).
