Below is an update on State legislative items of interest to the County of Los Angeles.



COUNTY ADVOCACY-RELATED ACTIONS

At the May 7th meeting, the Board of Supervisors took the following action:

• <u>SUPPORT SENATE BILL (SB) 233 (SKINNER)</u> - <u>PRACTICE OF MEDICINE</u>: <u>ARIZONA PHYSICIANS: ABORTIONS AND ABORTION-RELATED CARE FOR</u> ARIZONA PATIENTS



The Board directed the Chief Executive Office – Legislative Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations (CEO-LAIR) to support <u>SB 233</u>, legislation which would temporarily allow licensed Arizona doctors in good standing to provide abortion and abortion-related care to Arizona patients traveling to California through November 30, 2024. • SUPPORT SB 1053 (BLAKESPEAR) AND ASSEMBLY BILL (AB) 2236 (BAUER-KAHAN) TO CLOSE THE PLASTIC BAG LOOPHOLE



The Board directed CEO-LAIR to support <u>SB 1053</u> and <u>AB 2236</u>, legislation which would eliminate the exemption for plastic film bags in California's single-use bag ban. Additional details on the motion can be found here.

SUPPORT ASSEMBLY BILL (AB) 3233 (ADDIS) - LOCAL ENVIRONMENTAL CHOICE AND SAFETY ACT



The Board directed CEO-LAIR to send a five-signature letter to Assemblymember Dawn Addis, with a copy to the County's State Legislative Delegation, in support of <u>AB 3233</u>, legislation which would uphold the authority of local governments in passing ordinances that protect residents from the detrimental effects of oil and gas pollution. 

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The County is also advocating on the following legislation and proposals:

STATE





SUPPORT SB 1359 (WILK) - ILLEGAL DUMPING

<u>SB 1359</u> would make illegal the transportation and dumping of waste on public land, highways, and private land without the proper permit or license and increase penalties for illegal dumping, closing a loophole which allows dumping of waste on private land without a permit or license. • SUPPORT AB 2168 (KALRA) - PROSECUTION OF NONFELONY OFFENSES

AB 2168 would automatically dismiss certain nonfelony offenses for individuals held in County jails and youth detention facilities, convicted of a felony and due for transfer to a State prison. This bill would reduce the County jail population and save money associated with detaining these individuals. Additional details regarding this bill are available here.

• <u>SUPPORT IF AMENDED AB 2939 (RENDON) - INTERPRETIVE SERVICES AT PARKS</u>

<u>AB 2939</u> would require local parks to treat interpretive services offered by nonprofits and Native American tribes as an allowable use of a park. Amendments to ensure the preservation of local standards and use criteria would help fulfill the intent of expanded park access and services without the loss of park or service quality. SPOTLIGHT ON COUNTY SPONSORED BILLS



SB 1169 (Stern): Modernizing Flood Control Borrowing Capacity - This proposal would modernize the Los Angeles County Flood Control Act by eliminating the outdated \$4.5 million debt limit on federal loans, and aligning repayment terms with those of the standardized, federal Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Program and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Water Infrastructure Financing Program. Modernizing borrowing capacity and aligning with these federal programs' terms would provide the County access to critical financial assistance programs to finance projects which would safeguard communities from climate-induced flood risks and bolster water infrastructure. Status: Assembly - Read first time. Held at Desk.

AB 2455 (Gabriel): Whistleblower Protection: State an Local Government Procedures – This proposal modernizes current law that authorizes the County to operate a whistleblower hotline to identify and investigate fraud, waste, and abuse of government resources. Specifically, the bill updates the way an individual may submit a whistleblower tip to modern forms of communication, such as online form submission, email, text, etc., whereas current law explicitly allows for whistleblower tips to be submitted via phone call. Further, AB 2455 would explicitly authorize whistleblower tips and investigations to cover county contractors and subcontractors, whereas current law explicitly allows for whistleblower tips and investigations to encompass county employees. Lastly, this bill would authorize the auditor-controller to delegate whistleblower hotline duties to their staff, such as receiving, referring, and investigating whistleblower tips. 




LA County Ends Storm Season with 96.3 Billion Gallons of Captured Stormwater



More than 96.3 billion gallons of stormwater were captured and stored within LA County's reservoirs and delivered to spreading grounds for recharge of groundwater aquifers since Oct. 2023 when the storm season began. During that period, LA County harvested enough water to meet the needs of more than 2.4 million people for a year—about 24 percent of the region's annual demand.



The LA County Region is committed to increasing its local water resilience. The LA County Water Plan, adopted in late 2023, was developed collaboratively among LA County Public Works, local water agencies, tribes, and a wide range of municipal and nonprofit stakeholders.
